Through Space," on 3rd June 2025.

The study visit centred on two historically significant sites in Kuala Lumpur; the Kompleks Selangor Building and the Sin Sze Si Ya Temple Museum. At Kompleks Selangor, students explored how modern commercial needs can coexist with historical preservation through adaptive reuse strategies.

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Meanwhile, the Sin Sze Si Ya Temple offered deep insights into sacred spatial arrangements, cultural symbolism, and the architectural storytelling embedded within traditional temple design.



The trip enhanced students' understanding of architectural heritage and also inspired them to integrate context-aware thinking into their future design projects.



On 4th June 2025, students from the Graphic Design, Diploma in Graphic Design, Foundation in Art and Design, and Master of Design Management programmes visited Sin Sze Si Ya Temple Pioneers of Kuala Lumpur Museum & Temple.

The trip, organised by the Department of Design under the Faculty of Design and Built Environment, was guided by six lecturers and hosted by museum curator Ken Lim.

The visit provided students with valuable exposure to cultural narratives, historical artefacts, and spatial symbolism, enriching their creative understanding through real-world context.

Students from the degree and diploma programmes collaborated with the museum on a live project to redesign its visual identity, drawing inspiration from temple motifs and heritage objects.

Diploma and degree students focusing on motion graphics gathered visual material to support their ongoing narrative design assignments, while foundation students engaged in on-site sketching to study form and decorative detail. A postgraduate in Design Management also examined the museum's interpretive strategies, including exhibit layout and audience engagement.

Chong Yi Ling from Diploma in Graphic Design shared, "The symmetrical layout and carvings taught me how design can preserve cultural memory."

The field trip served as an enriching platform for students to connect design theory with cultural practice, encouraging deeper appreciation of history through a multidisciplinary design lens.





From 11th June to 2nd July 2025, Graphic Design students from the Bachelor and Diploma programmes took part in the Editorial Layout & Typography Workshop Series.

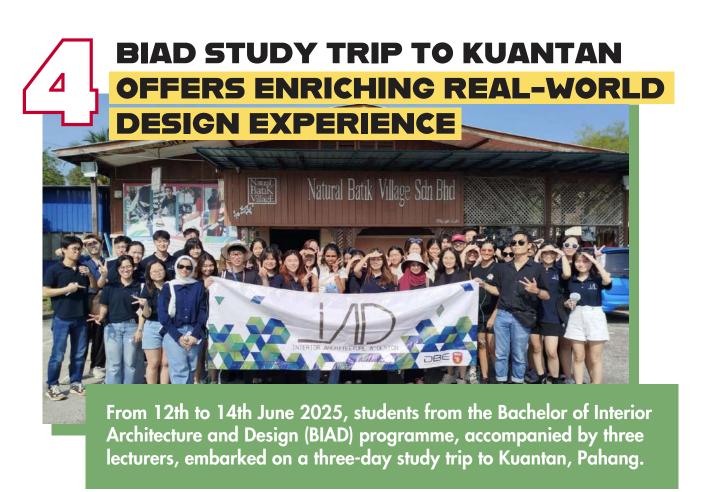
Held across four Wednesdays, the sessions were led by First City alumna and typography specialist Ms Lilian Tai. The workshop offered practical insight into editorial layout, grid systems, and typographic communication for both print and digital formats.

Each session tackled a different theme starting with grid and composition fundamentals, progressing to tone and rhythm in typography, exploring expressive layouts, and ending with critique and refinement. Ms Lilian, who brings experience from The Edge Communications and EFXCO Cyberjaya, guided students through hands-on exercises that helped sharpen visual hierarchy and design accuracy.

Lam Weng Yan, from the Diploma in Graphic Design, commented, "It encouraged us to embrace the exercises with freedom," while Lim Wei Xian, also from the Diploma in Graphic Design, added, "I used to overlook important layout details. This helped me refine my publication work."

The workshop concluded with students demonstrating stronger command of layout principles, typographic precision, and visual hierarchy. The structured, progressive approach —paired with real-time feedback—allowed students to apply design theory in practice, refine their eye for fine detail, and gain confidence in producing purposeful, professional-standard editorial work.

It enhanced the students' technical abilities and deepened their understanding of how thoughtful design influences readability, engagement, and communication—core competencies for success in the graphic design industry.

Students participated in various academic activities such as sketching exercises, site measurements, and a batik workshop, while also receiving direct feedback from site owners and design professionals. A morning briefing by Programme Coordinator IDr Fakhul Zaman provided additional context for the trip's learning objectives.

Reflecting on the experience, Jianne Elektra Cabales shared, "It was a well-arranged trip. The locals and building owners were resourceful and made site analysis work highly effective." Xiao Wei noted, "The trip was informative and engaging. It gave us a clearer understanding of the importance of thorough site analysis."

Overall, the study trip successfully bridged academic learning with professional exposure, reaffirming First City University College's commitment to producing industry-ready interior designers.





As part of the Future Design Star Award initiative, the Faculty of Design and Built Environment hosted the *Dialogue with Design Organisations* talk series on 25 June 2025.

The event featured two notable speakers from award-winning local design firms: Syahir Ali, Co-founder of Kort Studio, and Vienna Chew, Design Director of Millimetre Design. They shared their professional journeys, design philosophies, and insights into the challenges and evolving trends within Malaysia's interior design industry. Their award-winning project highlights offered students a rare look into real-world expectations and creative problem-solving in practice.

An engaging 'Ask Me Anything' session followed, allowing students to connect directly with the speakers.



"Hearing directly from award-winning designers was incredibly inspiring," said Ong Jing Zhi from Diploma in Interior Design while Lim Tong Ern from the same programme noted, "The session helped me understand the importance of branding and professionalism as a designer."



The session reinforced First City University College's commitment to equipping students with industry-relevant knowledge and meaningful exposure beyond the classroom.

With inspiring takeaways and practical insights, the talk left students more motivated and better prepared to pursue their future in interior design.



On 25th June 2025, students from the Diploma in Interior Design (DID) programme visited The Makeover Guys' office and experience centre at Emhub, Kota Damansara. The educational visit aimed to support the students' ongoing office design project by exposing them to real-world examples of functional, brand-driven workplace interiors.



The session began with an introduction by Vinise from the People & Culture team, followed by a presentation by the Founder & CEO, Mr. Gavin, who shared the company's mission, design direction, and how spatial planning reinforces team performance and culture. A guided office tour allowed students to observe first-hand how flexible layouts, brand integration, and creative design decisions come together to shape a modern office environment aligned with business goals.

Students found the visit both relevant and inspiring. "The tour helped connect what we're learning in class to how it actually works in real companies," said Hew Wen Xuan. Janice Tong added, "I really appreciated how the space was designed to encourage collaboration and creativity, exactly what we hope to reflect in our studio project."

The experience successfully bridged classroom learning with professional practice, offering students clear design references to apply in their academic work.





Led by industry representative Ms. Mae, the session introduced this year's competition theme— "Converge: Crafting Cultural Legacies"—and encouraged students to explore how cultural heritage can be reimagined through innovative, future-forward design thinking.

AYDA is one of the most prestigious platforms in Asia for budding designers to showcase their talents, gain professional recognition, and network with top players in the design industry. During the session, Ms. Mae walked students through the competition's goals, expectations, and judging criteria, offering valuable insights into how cultural elements can be translated into relevant, contemporary design concepts.

Students found the session both impactful and inspiring, leaving with renewed motivation and clarity.

Yaashhinii A/P Krishnan, a Year 2 student from the BA (Hons) in Interior Architecture & Design programme, shared, "The recent AYDA competition brief session at our college was inspiring and insightful. ## THE ART OF SCRIPTWRITING FOR THE DIGITAL AGE

On 4 June 2025, First City University College hosted a dynamic workshop titled "From Idea to Screen: Scriptwriting for Short Films, Advertisements, and Vlogs."



Tailored for Mass Communication students, the session was designed to introduce participants to the fundamentals of content creation across diverse digital formats. The workshop aimed to equip aspiring storytellers with industry-relevant scriptwriting techniques and a deeper understanding of how to write effectively for film, advertising, and online media. The workshop guided participants through the full script development process—from conceptualizing idea and structuring narratives to building characters and crafting impactful dialogue. Students learned how to adapt their writing based on specific purposes and target audiences, with a focus on how to evoke emotion in short films, deliver sharp messaging in advertisements, and maintain authenticity in vlogs.

The highly interactive session featured brainstorming exercises, collaborative scriptwriting in teams, and live feedback from the facilitator. Visual planning techniques such as storyboarding and shot lists were also introduced, giving students a more complete view of the content creation pipeline.

By the end of the workshop, students expressed new motivation and excitement for content creation. "It was such a fun and hands-on experience. Working in teams to develop our own scripts gave me the confidence to start writing my own content," shared Gabriella Fauzia. Another participant, Nicole Leong, reflected, "I used to think ads were just quick and easy, but now I see how much thought goes into every second. This session changed my whole perspective."

The workshop reinforced First City University College's commitment to providing experiential learning opportunities that prepare students for the demands of the creative industry—nurturing both competence and confidence in the next generation of content creators.



### HARNESSING AI FOR BUSINESS PRODUCTIVITY





First City University College recently hosted a Continuing Professional Development Talk titled "Unleashing the Creative Use of Al for Productivity" in collaboration with the Malaysian Institute of Management (MIM). Held on 25th June 2025, the session was led by Al and sales strategy expert Mr. David Hooi.

Mr. Hooi introduced a wide range of AI tools including ChatGPT, Claude AI, MidJourney, Leonardo AI, Runway, Luma, and Heygen. Through live demonstrations and practical examples, he highlighted how these tools can be used to boost productivity across marketing, education, business, and creative design. Participants were particularly engaged during the segments on prompt engineering and content automation, which showed how AI can support real-world tasks with speed and creativity.

The talk received strong positive feedback for being both inspiring and actionable. "I never knew AI could help so much with design and content creation. This talk opened up so many possibilities for my assignments and future career," shared student Gabriella Fauzia from the Foundation in Business Administration programme.

The event concluded with students gaining practical strategies to integrate AI tools like ChatGPT, MidJourney, and Runway into their academic work and creative projects. They left with a clearer understanding of how AI can enhance productivity, support real-world tasks, and elevate content creation.



The Faculty of Computer Science and Technology conducted an internship supervision visit to YNY Technology Sdn. Bhd.

The visit focused on monitoring the internship progress of Phitchapha Omkaew, a student from the Bachelor of Computer Science (Intelligent Systems) (Honours) programme, who is currently placed under the company's IT Department for her three-month industrial training.

Supervisors Miss Nurul Syafiqa binti Mohd Nor, Miss Sherylaidah binti Samsuddin, and Mr. Sukri bin Mohd Taib led the visit. The team held a productive discussion with YNY Technology's internship supervisor, Mr. Steven Lai, who spoke positively about Phitchapha's performance and proactive attitude.



Phitchapha presented a comprehensive overview of her internship, where she highlighted her involvement in automating repetitive tasks using Microsoft Power Automate and integrating an Al chatbot into the GLPI system to streamline IT support operations.

She also expressed appreciation for the collaborative work culture and mentorship provided by her colleagues. Her tasks are aligned with the programme's learning objectives and expose her to real-world applications of intelligent systems in a corporate IT environment.

The faculty commended Phitchapha's growth and noted the positive environment provided by YNY Technology.

This successful visit reinforces the importance of structured industrial training and supports ongoing collaboration between First City University College and YNY Technology Sdn. Bhd. for future internship placements.





Chen Kai Liang, a student from the Bachelor of Software Engineering (Honours) programme, is currently undergoing a three-month internship with Silverlake's IT Department.

Internship supervisors Dr. Muhammad Hanafi Bin Yusop and Mr. Sukri Mohd Taib met with the company's internship supervisor, Mr. Kuah Wei Yek, to discuss the student's progress and contributions. Mr. Kuah commended Chen for his commitment and problem-solving abilities. Chen then delivered a detailed internship presentation outlining his tasks under two departments: the AAMS Team, where he resolved tickets and developed HR-related system functions, and the Release Management Team, where he managed bank software releases, validated GitLab commits, and deployed materials using Jenkins. He also attended training on Mobius II, an upcoming AI-driven banking platform, gaining exposure to tools like iAPI, VCOS, and CI/CD pipelines.

The faculty expressed satisfaction with the student's performance and recommended deeper collaboration with Silverlake Axis to expand future internship placements.

"Working here has helped me understand the demands of enterprise software development. It's been an eye-opening experience," shared Chen Kai Liang. "We're proud to host committed interns like Chen who are ready to learn and contribute," added Mr. Kuah Wei Yek.





#### PRACTICAL BRINGS THEORY TO LIFE

On 20 June 2025, students from the Faculty of Computer Science and Technology gathered at the Future Tech Lab for a Distributed Systems Lab Practical designed to bridge the gap between classroom theory and real-world application.

The session focused on a task that seems deceptively simple—terminating CAT 5 network cables—but quickly revealed its complexity. Students discovered that the process requires not only precision and patience but also strict compliance with cabling standards. Through this hands-on work, they came to appreciate how easily things can go wrong during such installations and why meticulous supervision is essential in high-stakes environments like data centre construction.

By physically creating and testing network connections, students connected their technical theory to practical realities. They experienced firsthand how routine tasks in computer and data centre operations demand both detail-oriented work and a strong foundation in advanced knowledge. The lab also opened conversations about future improvements in network cabling systems, encouraging students to think critically about innovation in this field.

Reflecting on the experience, Adzreza Syahmie Bin 'Adzzham Syahzany shared: "Doing this practically gives new insight to the theory work learnt so far."

His words captured the value of the session, which offered students not only the challenge of hands-on problem-solving but also the deeper appreciation that practical application brings to theoretical learning.



Bytes Buzz Live! Episode 3, organised by the Faculty of Computer Science and Technology for its Diploma and Degree students, took place on 25 June 2025 and featured two eye-opening sessions designed to strengthen both technical and real-world skills.

The first session, KNIME on Fire: Building Insight Pipelines without Code, was led by Mr. Mohd Sukry Bin Mohd Taib. Students were introduced to KNIME, an open-source platform that simplifies the complex world of data analytics with its drag-and-drop, visual workflow interface. With KNIME, data preparation, reporting, and even machine learning become faster, easier, and more accessible—without the barrier of heavy coding. Students learned how KNIME empowers businesses, with major organisations in Malaysia such as Petronas, Telekom Malaysia (TM), Maybank, MDEC, and the Department of Statistics Malaysia already adopting it.

Reflecting on the session, student Adzreza Syahmie Bin 'Adzzham Syahzany shared: "KNIME is a useful tool to display data and a lot of companies want to hire people who are good at using the tool." This insight underscored the practical value of mastering KNIME for future career opportunities.

The second session, IT for Community: Digital Services & Healthcare for the Senior Elderly, featured Mr. Mohd Norfitri Bin Nordin. Students explored how IT innovations are playing a critical role in supporting the elderly through digital healthcare solutions and safety systems. From emergency response devices to medical monitoring and home safety audits, the talk highlighted how technology can empower seniors to live independently while providing peace of mind to families.

By the end of Bytes Buzz Live!, students walked away with more than just technical knowledge—they gained a deeper understanding of how digital tools like KNIME can enhance employability, and how IT applications can make a real difference in society.

These sessions not only broadened their skillsets but also reinforced how their learning connects to meaningful, future-focused careers.

#### DANGERS OF VAPING AND SO EMPOWERS 1,000 STUDENTS WITH AWARENESS AND PREVENTION SKILLS

The Student Services Department, in collaboration with the Student Recruitment Team of First City University College, conducted an impactful awareness talk titled "Dangers of Vaping and Scams" for 1,000 secondary school students at SMJK Yoke Kuan.

The event aimed to educate young individuals on the harmful effects of vaping and how to protect themselves from increasingly sophisticated scams—both digital and interpersonal.

The programme was conducted in two sessions: the morning session welcomed 500 students, followed by another 500 in the afternoon. Mr. Weladavi Rahula led the first half of the talk, focusing on the dangers of vaping. He discussed the serious health risks associated with vaping—including its impact on memory, concentration, and brain development.

Highlighting substances like nicotine and diacetyl found in vapes, Mr. Weladavi debunked the myth that vaping is a safer alternative to smoking and urged students to consider the long-term harm to both personal health and the environment.

In the second half of the session, Ms. Teh Chia Li addressed the growing threat of scams. She introduced students to various types of scams such as phishing, love scams, job scams, and mobile application fraud. Ms. Teh also offered practical advice on digital safety—such as avoiding public Wi-Fi, creating strong passwords, and never sharing OTPs (One-Time Passwords). She equipped students with the knowledge to recognise red flags, especially when scammers attempt to manipulate victims through urgency or too-good-to-be-true offers.

The session concluded with tokens of appreciation presented by SMJK Yoke Kuan to both speakers. Feedback from students and teachers was overwhelmingly positive, with many expressing appreciation for the relevant and timely content.
