First City University College welcomed new students through its September 2025 Intake Orientation Programme, held on 29 September 2025 at the Student Services Lounge.

Welcome messages were delivered by faculty representatives including Assistant Professor Chua Huwi Huwi, Dean of the Faculty of Design and Built Environment, Assistant Professor Komlavathi A/P Subramaniam, Acting Dean of the Faculty of Business and Communication, and Interim Dean Mr. Lye Boon Han from the Faculty of Computer Science and Technology.

SPARK TO SPECTACLE - SEQUENCE SEPTEMBER 2025



From 26 to 28 September 2025, First City University College celebrated the 23rd anniversary of its Sequence Showcase with the theme "Spark to Spectacle."

Held at The School, Jaya One, the showcase presented the works of graduating students from six design programmes, including Interior Architecture, Furniture Design, Graphic Design, and Fashion Marketing. The event was officiated by Adjunct Professor IDr Joe Chan Wan Hoe, Deputy President of the Malaysian Institute of Interior Designers.

This year's showcase recognised outstanding achievements with 16 awards in total, including six Best Showcase Awards—one for each programme—and 10 special awards for perseverance, creativity, leadership, collaboration, and impact.

Among the winners was Daniel Wong from the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Graphic Design programme, who received both the Best Showcase Award and the Persistence Award.

"Today is a very joyful experience because I managed to win two awards even though I did not expect to win anything," he said.

Another recipient was Chin See Mun from the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) Interior Architecture and Design programme, who received the Perseverance Award. "Thank you for everyone's hard work, and thank you for the award. Our showcase will be held from 26 to 28 September," she shared.



The showcase also featured public activities such as workshops and craft booths, extending the celebration to the wider community.

1 CELEBRATING HERITAGE - STUDENT PROJECTS AT SIN SZE SI YA TEMPLE



On 2 September 2025, students from the Faculty of Design & Built Environment showcased their project “ICON of HERITAGE” at the Sin Sze Si Ya Temple, Pioneers of Kuala Lumpur Museum.



This event celebrated the temple’s history through creative branding, logos, and visual ideas inspired by its legacy as Kuala Lumpur’s oldest temple.

Students also displayed “Echoes of Tradition,” a visual collection created by Foundation in Art and Design students. Their work reinterpreted the temple’s artefacts, motifs, colors, and textures using techniques like jelly plate printing and digital art, blending tradition with modern design.



The event ended with a certificate presentation from temple trustees Mr. Chau Kuet Thai and Mr. See Kam Fook.

2 DIPLOMA IN INTERIOR DESIGN STUDENTS SHOWCASE FINAL PROJECTS TO INDUSTRY EXPERTS



On 3 September 2025, Semester 7 students from the Diploma in Interior Design at First City University College completed their final design studio presentations, marking the culmination of months of work.

The session served as a platform for students to present their projects before a panel of industry practitioners and academic evaluators. More than an academic requirement, it tested their creativity, clarity, and readiness for real-world practice.

"This final presentation taught me the importance of clarity and purpose in design. It's not just about being creative—execution matters," said student Law Jun Jie. Fellow student Lee Wei Yan appreciated the insights: "The assessors didn't just critique our work—they shared real experiences that revealed the profession's actual demands." For Hor Jean Ming, the process was both intense and rewarding.

"The design review showed me where I stand and what I need to improve to meet industry expectations."

Organised by the Faculty of Design and Built Environment, the session brought together industry professionals Mr. Keeon Leong (Fooam Workstudio), Mr. Kelvin Lee (Deuce Studio), Ms. Loh Kei Yee (PARA Studio), and Mr. Benjamin Kim (Genius Loci, Singapore). They were joined by part-time lecturers Ms. Chin Sing Nyee, Jessie, and Ms. Joanne Low, as well as academic assessors Ms. Macy Quah (Module Leader), Ts. Wayne Ng, and Ar. IDr Elyn Tan.

The reviewers' feedback bridged the gap between classroom learning and professional practice, offering constructive guidance that helped students refine their work.

Lecturer Ms. Macy Quah noted, "The students gained more than grades today—they gained confidence and industry-relevant insights that will shape their transition into the workplace."

By the end, the graduating cohort left with clearer direction, renewed confidence, and stronger readiness to begin their careers in interior design.

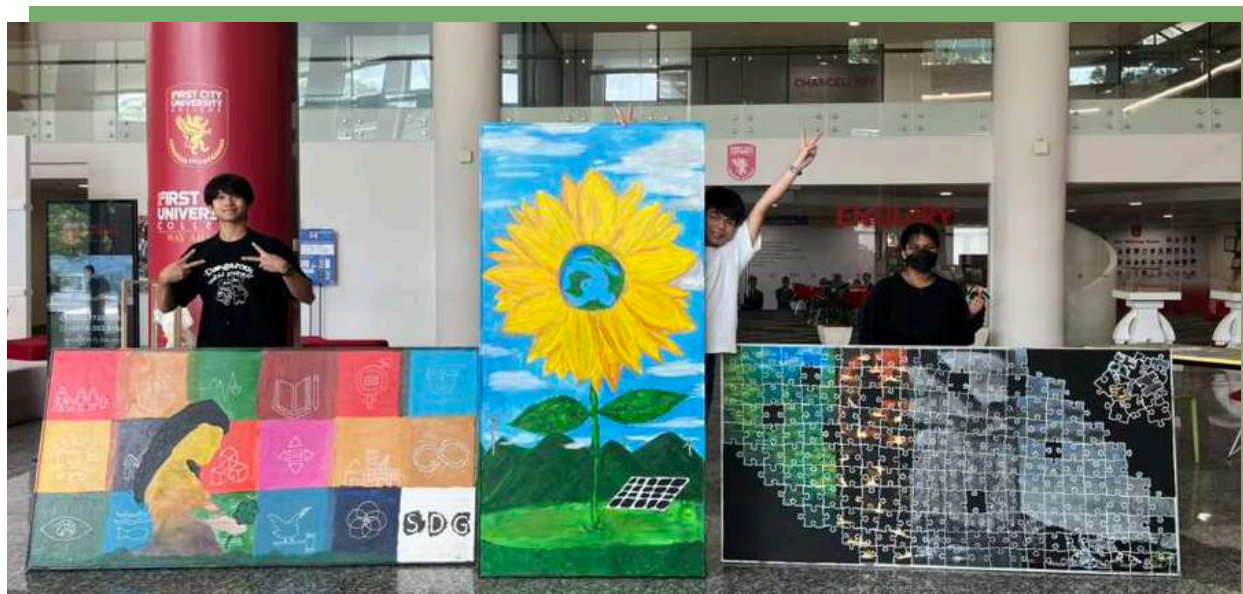

CONNECTING DESIGN THEORY WITH REAL-WORLD PRACTICE:

INTERIOR DESIGN STUDENTS EXPLORE PARAGON CARPET AND DE'NATION

On 21 October 2025, Diploma in Interior Design students went on a field trip to Paragon Carpet Distributor in Balakong and De'Nation Interior Design Showroom in Jalan Klang Lama, where they explored the latest material innovations and gained insight into real-world production processes.

At Paragon Carpet, students gained firsthand exposure to the intricate stages of carpet manufacturing, from yarn preparation and tufting to backing and finishing. They also learned how sustainable practices, quality control, and digital design technologies are integrated into modern production processes. The visit to De'Nation further expanded students' perspectives on interior material applications. Through exposure to a wide range of finishes, furnishings, and modern design solutions, students explored diverse interior elements such as wallpaper, curtain systems, and SPC flooring.

Diploma in Interior Design Semester 2 student Lau Yu Kee shared, "The trips to both Paragon Carpet and De'Nation were very insightful as they provided a comprehensive understanding of the production process, from the initial stages to the final outcomes."

Similarly, Semester 3 student Chloe Lee reflected, "The field trips were very fruitful and provided valuable exposure to various materials and finishes. The visit to the carpet factory allowed us to observe firsthand how cut pile carpets are produced using specialized machinery, deepening our understanding of manufacturing processes. The interactive Q&A session at the end made the learning experience more engaging, and it was encouraging that three of us won prizes."

Through these field trips, students learned to apply classroom knowledge to real industry practices, understand the importance of sustainable and innovative design, and see how material choices shape the look, feel, and function of a space.

Students also strengthened their critical thinking and professional skills, preparing them to succeed as emerging design professionals.





9 ASIA DESIGN SHARING 2025: EXPANDING PERSPECTIVES FOR A DESIGN-DRIVEN FUTURE

On 21 and 22 October 2025, staff and students from the Master of Design Management (MDM) programme attended the Asia Design Sharing (ADS2025), a seminar and dialogue organized by the Malaysia Design Council (MRM) under the Ministry of Investment, Trade and Industry (MITI).

The event was held at the Seri Pacific Hotel, Kuala Lumpur and was organised in conjunction with Malaysia's ASEAN Chairmanship 2025.

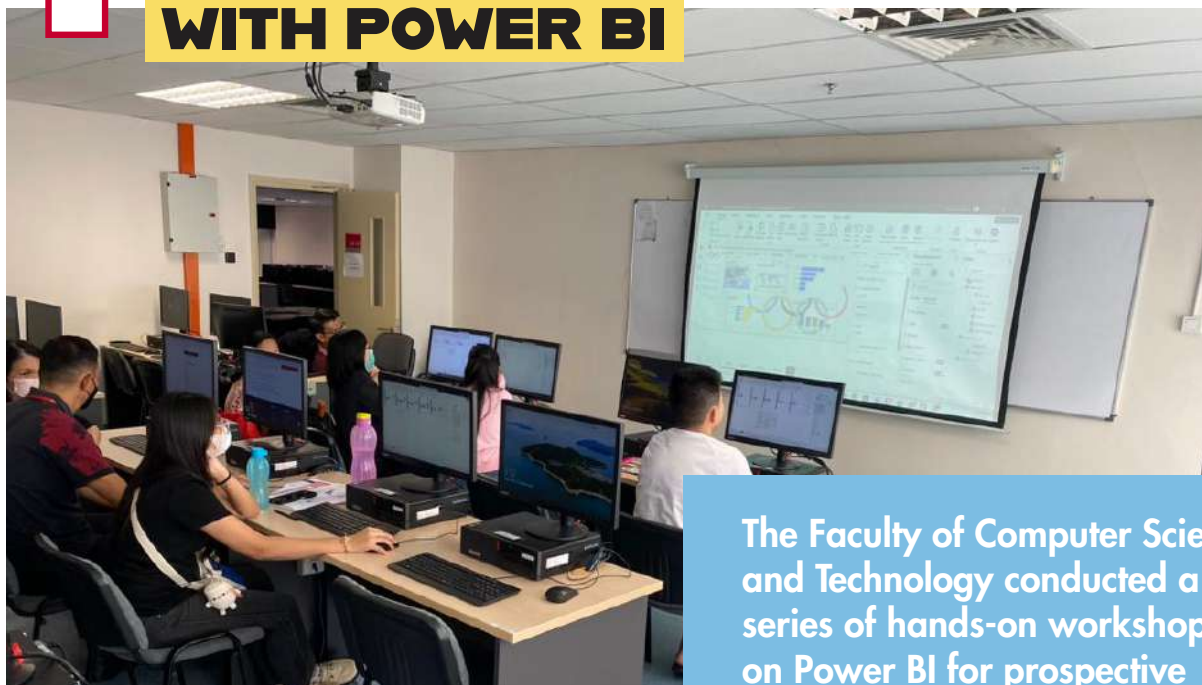

The Faculty of Computer Science and Technology conducted a series of hands-on workshops on Power BI for prospective students in September.

The sessions took place during the University's Open Day on 6 September, as well as during campus visits from SMK ACS Kampar and SMK Taman Molek on 14 and 25 September.

The workshops were facilitated by Dr. Mohd Ridhwan Hilmi Bin Mohd Adnan, Mohd Sukry Bin Mohd Taib, Cham Kah Loon, and Mohd Norfitri Bin Nordin. Participants were provided with an engaging introduction to the field of data analytics through the use of an Olympic Games dataset. Students gained hands-on experience in designing interactive dashboards, generating professional reports and charts, and applying advanced features such as maps and filters to transform raw data into meaningful visual insights.

Beyond technical skills, the workshops helped them develop analytical thinking, problem-solving ability, and creativity in presenting information, all of which are key to becoming future-ready professionals.

By bridging classroom learning with real-world applications, the Faculty of Computer Science and Technology continues to inspire the next generation of IT professionals, business analysts, and digital innovators.





2 **BYTES BUZZ LIVE!** **EPISODE 4 EXPLORES AI IN CREATIVITY AND HEALTHCARE**

The Faculty of Computer Science and Technology hosted Bytes Buzz Live! Episode 4 on 10 September 2025, streamed live from the Mass Communication Studio. With more than 360 combined views, the session highlighted the potential of artificial intelligence (AI) in both the creative industries and medical research.

Ts. Syahirah Binti Ibrahim opened the discussion with insights into generative AI, explaining how machines are now able to create content through large language models and other advanced systems. She emphasised both its opportunities and risks, from enabling design and innovation to producing misinformation, deepfakes, and biased outputs.

The session then shifted to healthcare, where Dr. Ridhwan Hilmi Bin Mohd Adnan demonstrated how AI can assist in predicting eye disease through image processing. By applying computer vision to extract regions of interest and training machine learning models, his work achieved more accurate classifications of eye redness severity.



Students responded positively, noting that the talks made complex topics accessible and inspired them to consider AI's real-world applications with a critical mindset.

3 CYBERDSA 2025 ENHANCES STUDENTS' UNDERSTANDING OF CYBERSECURITY INNOVATIONS

On 2 October 2025, the Faculty of Computer Science and Technology organised an educational visit to CyberDSA 2025 at the Malaysia International Trade and Exhibition Centre (MITEC), Kuala Lumpur, for students from the Bachelor of Information Technology (Networking & Security) (Honours) and Bachelor in Electronic Engineering with Honours programmes.



The study visit, jointly organised with the Tech Club, provided students with a hands-on opportunity to explore the latest innovations in cybersecurity and digital defence.

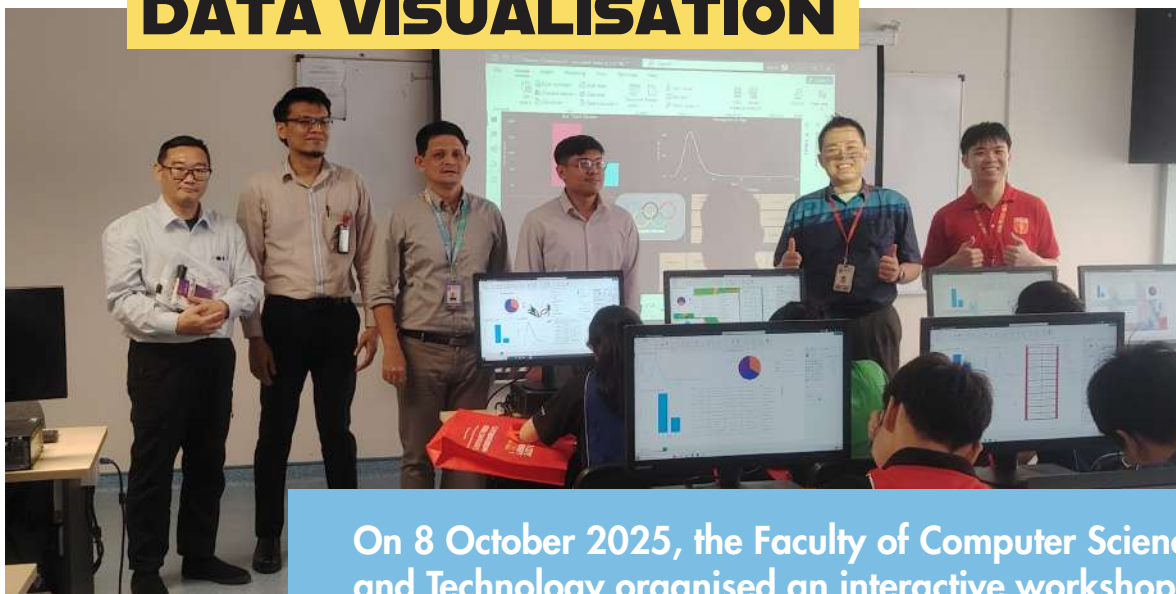
Highlights of the trip included a talk on "The Future of Post Quantum Technology for Critical Sectors" by Dr. Amir Hamzah from the Pusat Teknologi dan Pengurusan Kriptologi Malaysia (PTPKM), followed by a booth tour featuring top cybersecurity companies such as Splunk, InsiderSecurity, YesWeHack, Bitdefender, CyberSecurity Malaysia, and IGS Berhad.



The visit strengthened students' understanding of AI, IoT, blockchain, and quantum computing while encouraging them to think critically and collaborate. "I gained valuable knowledge about the latest cybersecurity trends, best practices, and regulations," said Ng Yan Hui from the Bachelor of Information Technology (Networking & Security) (Honours) programme. "The event also highlighted the importance of strengthening Malaysia's IT infrastructure through both local and international players," added Chin Zhi Kuang from the Bachelor in Electronic Engineering with Honours programme.

The experience inspired students to stay ahead of emerging digital threats and contribute to a safer, more resilient cyber ecosystem.

4 DISCOVER THE POWER OF DATA - ONE CHALLENGE AT A TIME: HANDS-ON LEARNING IN DATA VISUALISATION



On 8 October 2025, the Faculty of Computer Science and Technology organised an interactive workshop that gave students an introductory experience in data literacy and visual communication.

Designed for students taking their first steps into data analysis, the session focused on helping participants understand how raw information becomes meaningful insights.

Facilitators Mr. Cham Kah Loon, Mr. Mohd Sukry Bin Mohd Taib, Mr. Mohd Norfitri Bin Mohd Nordin, and Dr. Mohd Ridhwan Hilmi Bin Mohd Adnan guided students through lively discussions on how data is collected, categorised, and interpreted. Students compared examples of good and poor data collection methods and learned how accuracy affects outcomes.



A key highlight was the “Visual Clarity Challenge,” where students were presented with messy datasets and asked to choose the most suitable chart type—bar, line, or pie—to communicate information clearly. This activity helped them appreciate how visual choices can change the audience’s understanding of data.

The workshop gave students a strong foundation in understanding patterns, interpreting information, and presenting findings—all skills cultivated in First City University College’s technology and analytics -related programmes.

By the end, students gained the confidence to approach data with curiosity and critical thinking, recognising its importance in studies, daily life, and future careers.

5 FACULTY OF COMPUTER SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY STUDENTS EXPLORE REAL-WORLD BROADCAST TECHNOLOGY AT RTM



On 9 October 2025, students from the Foundation in Computer Science and Technology and Diploma in Information Technology visited Angkasapuri Kota Media, RTM, to see how classroom learning is applied in a professional broadcast environment.

During the tour, students explored Ai FM, Radio Muzik, Television Studio M1, and the VTR Control room, gaining exposure to cutting-edge technologies such as artificial intelligence (AI), cloud storage, networking, digital cameras, video graphics, and virtual studios. They also had hands-on experience with video production software, green screen technology, lighting setups, and camera operations, learning how technical systems and teamwork come together to produce live broadcasts.

Loke Qin Hui from Foundation in Computer Science and Technology shared, "I experienced the Chinese radio channel and other language channels, saw how they operate the radio system and learned how to operate a big live stream camera."

I also learned and saw how the DJ operated behind the scenes and experienced the green screen room."

Danya Loo Yixuan from Diploma in Information Technology added, "As this was my first visit to RTM, it was a good experience for me. I could see a lot of new equipment and how they do their work. I also visited the Ai FM studio and others as well. Overall, it was pretty good."



The visit gave students practical skills with professional tools and technologies, helping them connect classroom theory with real-world IT and computer science applications, and preparing them for future careers in technology-driven industries.

Many students expressed surprise at how accessible data tools can be and shared that the experience sparked their interest in fields such as Artificial Intelligence, Data Science, Business Analytics, and Information Technology—fields that are explored across First City University College's programmes.

This session not only deepened their understanding of data-driven problem-solving but also broadened their awareness of future pathways available in the digital economy.
